Mr Stefan WESSMAN

Senior Adviser at the Finnish National Board of Antiquities, National Focal Point for Finland's cultural world heritage sites, member of the World Heritage Committee, expert, researcher and lecturer of Turku University

Has been working as an authority with protection, management and conservation of underwater and terrestrial archaeology for more than 15 years.

Since 2011 – National focal point for Finland's cultural world heritage. Since 2014 – Senior adviser at the Finnish National Board of Antiquities, working as a cultural expert on the Finnish World Heritage Committee team responsible for protection of cultural environment, landscape and urban planning, implementation of Convention for the Protection of Cultural Property in the Event of Armed Conflict, the Convention Concerning the Protection of the world cultural and natural heritage and the Convention on Protection of the Underwater Cultural Heritage.

Holds master's degree of arts in Archaeology at the University of Turku (2005), where he started his PhD in 2007. Since 2002 – researcher of cultural heritage in southwestern Finland, including aspects of protection, conservation, management, heritage impact assessment, for ex., HIA of the Nordstream natural gas pipeline in the Finnish EEZ before and during the construction, responsible for several underwater excavations/investigations on different shipwrecks. Gives lectures on archaeology, maritime archaeology and culture heritage protection at University of Turku & Hanko summer University.

Mr Richard VEILLON

Project Officer, Policy and Statutory Meetings Unit, UNESCO World Heritage Centre

Since 2004 has been involved in the preparation of sessions of the World Heritage Committee, General Assemblies of States Parties and expert meetings, coordinates the State of Conservation (SoC) reporting process on world heritage properties and manages the World Heritage Committee online Information System on the SoC of world heritage properties.

Holds master's degree in Biology and Ecology (University of Rennes, France) and a post-graduate degree in Museology of Natural Sciences and Humanities (National Natural History Museum of Paris and University of Rennes, France). In 1998 he joined the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs, worked at the Embassy of France in Zimbabwe where he headed a bilateral cooperation project in the field of museums and heritage, and worked on several world heritage properties.

Dr Britta RUDOLFF

Managing Director of the Institute for Heritage Management and interim Chair of Heritage Management at Brandenburg University of Technology, ICOMOS World Heritage Advisor

Britta is the Managing Director of Institute for Heritage Management and interim Chair of Heritage Management at the Brandenburg University of Technology. Initially trained as a conservator, Britta acquired postgraduate qualifications in heritage management and received a doctoral degree in the cultural geography / world heritage at universities in Germany and Canada. In the past two decades she has specialized in strategic planning and management of cultural heritage.

Dr Britta Rudolff gained insights into international and interdisciplinary fields of work, including through her role as an advisor to the Ministry of Culture in Syria, as coordinator of an ICCROM Forum and as personal advisor to the Minister of Culture of Bahrain. She collaborated with various partners in the context of these conventions, first at ICCROM, later as a member and rapporteur of the World Heritage Committee and now as a World Heritage Advisor for ICOMOS International.

Dr Christopher Young

Expert and consultant of the world heritage, historian and archaeologist

Beginning 25 years ago as the site coordinator for Hadrian's Wall, in 1999 he became the international focal point for English world heritage, the government's advisor on heritage in England. Ch. Young is a leading expert and consultant of World Heritage Committee, who took part revising Operational Guidelines, worked intensively on Periodic Reporting mechanism, analysing the responses to the second-round questionnaire of Periodic Reporting and redesigning the questionnaire for the third cycle, which was presented during 41st World Heritage Committee session in Krakow.

From 1998 to 2014 he attended all meetings of the World Heritage Committee as a part of the United Kingdom official delegation, worked on many nominations and world heritage properties' management issues not only in United Kingdom, but also in Europe and in East and South-East Asia, including sites in Laos, Vietnam, Bangladesh, India and Japan.

Dr Ch. Young is a historian and archaeologist, developing approaches to the sustainable management of the historic environment. His initial research was carried out on the Roman pottery industry of the Oxford region, an industrial centre of the Roman province of Britain. He has also excavated on Roman and Medieval sites. He is a Visiting Professor at the Institute for Sustainable Heritage of University College London, and teaches there and at the Ironbridge International Institute for Cultural Heritage of the University of Birmingham. Ch. Young is a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of London and a Corresponding Member of the German Archaeological Institute.
